Auction in Review

Last month, we held our Annual plant auction in the Garden House at Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden.

At 7 p.m. the room was opened to the public to come in and browse and study the many plants that were up for auction this year.

The plants were arranged on several large tables around the room; a room that was filled with interesting Halloween decorations, courtesy of a Halloween party that the Garden held the previous weekend. But strangely, the plants fit right in.

Though not as many plants as in previous years, the room nevertheless had an abundance of very nice specimens for buyers.

As guests made their way around the room, they helped themselves to the assorted refreshments (provided by our hospitality committee, headed by Martha Bogaards and Emaly Israel).

We were fortunate to have Pam and David Barrow manning the sign-in table and keeping track of the bids for the evening.

Our Auctioneer, Tom Moore, was introduced by Reggie Whitehead. Reggie also introduced the "plant runners" for the evening, himself, Debbie Lamb, Mike O'Dea and Argeo Hernandez.

The auction began with fierce bidding. Tom Moore who has been our auctioneer for many years now, masterfully held the evening together, and auctioned off all of the plants within 2 hours.

One of the highlights of the evening was an **Impatiens**. Not just

any **Impatiens**, but a caudexiforme, **Impatiens mirabilis**. This particular **Impatiens**, Reggie told us, can grow approximately 2 feet high, and they have a distinctive caudex base. The bidding on this plant was impressive, and the audience cheered for the buyer when the bidding was completed.

As with all auctions, there will be some bargains, and then there will be some cries of "Did I really pay that much for that?" But at this year's auction, there were lots of excellent plants that went for great prices. One such example was a nice specimen of **Angiopteris angustifolia**, which went for, shall we say, "a song."

This year's assortment of rare trees, hard to come by ferns, specimen hanging baskets, orchids and palms, all were greeted with glee.

Earl Grey - Mint or Citrus

It is always a shock when a long held concept is shattered by the truth. I had always understood that Earl Grey tea possessed its unique flavor due to the addition of leaves of bergamot (*Monarda didyma*), Boy, was I misinformed.

It seems that the unusual aroma of Earl Grey tea is derived from the oil of a citrus fruit, *Citrus bergamia*. This citrus seems to be a hybrid between a seville orange and a pear shaped lemon and got its name from the town in Italy, Bergamo where it was grown for its fragrant oil used in the perfume industry. It would be neat to grow this citrus in Florida

but it's quite sensitive to cold weather and cannot stand the low acid limestone of the Miami area.

While we're on the subject of tea (an infusion of fermented leaves of *Camellia sinensis*— *Black tea*), there are many different kinds of tea, green, oolong and white.
